Accommodation

Our student residences

We understand that finding a safe place to live is a priority as a parent. We have over 1,200 single study bedrooms, across four residences: David Moxon, Kimber, Deanary and Chantry across our campus, to suit different budgets and needs. This accommodation is safe and secure, with a residence team available on site 24/7. Included in the rent is up to 100MB WiFi access, personal contents insurance, social rooms, repairs and maintenance services, cleaning of communal areas and coverage for all utility bills.

We have a dedicated accommodation team at the university to support you with finding your child the perfect place to live. As your child is under 18, they will need ensuite accommodation (please remember to let the team know when you make enquiries).

Student support

Students at Solent University have access to a range of specialist support services. International students often have specific questions, and our dedicated teams are always available to provide assistance. At Solent University, help is always at hand.

International Foundation Programme team support

Our QA Higher Education Pathway staff will be on hand to support your child through their International Foundation Programme. Facilitating weekly check-ins with all under 18 students and undertaking enhanced attendance monitoring.

Student Hub

This is a central space where your child can access all of the guidance and support they may need during their time at Solent University. Under-18 students will be assigned a dedicated contact within the Hub. Your child will be able to book 30-minute face-to-face appointment with their contact via a booking system to discuss support and guidance.

The International Advice team

Your child will find the International Advice team within the university's Student Hub. They're here to support students throughout their studies and to help them get the most out of student life. They offer information, guidance, and advice on various issues, including visas and immigration, life in the UK, and employment and careers. They are also available to help students if they have any questions prior to arriving in the UK.

If your child requires further study advice and academic support, our Succeed@Solent team is here to help. They ensure students meet the higher expectations for quality, structure, presentation, and content of assignments, essays, and projects required at degree level.

Living in the UK

Depending on where in the world your child is arriving from, life in the UK may seem very different to what they are used to. This is a completely normal reaction to moving abroad.

Cultural differences

When your child arrives in England, they will undoubtedly encounter many new experiences. Even though things seem very similar, subtle differences can make everyday routines and simple actions challenging and frustrating. If your child experiences symptoms like loneliness or sadness, here are some helpful tips for managing cultural differences:

Accommodation

'Right to Rent' Act: Since February 2016, international students who do not live in halls of residence or in purpose-built student accommodation have to prove their immigration status to their landlord to show that they have the 'right to rent'.

Council tax

Council tax is a property-based tax set by local authorities (councils) in England, Scotland and Wales to help pay for services that they provide, such as libraries, the police and fire brigade. If you live in university halls or a house occupied solely by full-time students, you'll be exempt from paying council tax. You can get a council tax exemption certificate from your school office once you have enrolled at the university.

Banking

Banks are usually open 9.30am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday, and some may open on a Saturday morning. They shut on public holidays.

Emergencies

In case of emergency where an immediate response is required, your child should dial 999. This is the UK's emergency number for the police, fire brigade or ambulance services. They can also dial 101 to contact the police in non-emergency situations where immediate attendance is not required.

Healthcare

If your child is from within the EU/EEA, they should obtain a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) as evidence that they are entitled to reciprocal healthcare provided by the NHS while studying in the UK. The EHIC will only cover them if it has been issued by the authorities in their country of residence, before they travel to the UK.

Non EU/EEA nationals

If your child is from outside the EU/EEA and their course lasts for more than six months, they are entitled to full healthcare under the NHS from the beginning of their stay, as long as they have paid the Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS) as part of their student visa application. If your child's course lasts less than six months, they should take out private healthcare insurance (unless they are a national of a country that has a reciprocal health agreement with the UK).

Registering with a doctor

When your child has enrolled at the university, they will need to register with a doctor. This is a priority and should be completed within the first few weeks of arrival. Most students, if living in halls, choose to register with St Mary's Surgery. Visit their website for more information here: stmaryssurgery.nhs.uk. Religion

Regardless of your child's faith, the university's multi-faith centre provides support to students in an inclusive and non-judgmental environment.

Retail opening hours

Most shops and retail outlets in Southampton are open between 9am and 5.30pm, Monday-Saturday, and until 9pm on Thursdays for 'late-night' shopping. Some are open on Sundays between 10am and 4pm. Supermarkets are usually open until 8pm but some larger stores are open 24 hours from Monday to Friday. Information on local supermarkets will be available to your child in the induction programme.

The University has its own on-campus newsagent, C-Store, that sells a range of soft drinks, confectionery, newspapers and magazines. Solent's student-run store, Re:So, sells clothing, accessories, art and gifts designed and produced by students and graduates of the University.

Weather

The British weather is changeable, and the winter months can be very cold. Temperatures can vary considerably within a single day. In September, Southampton typically experiences temperatures ranging from 9°C to 22°C. Students are advised to bring warm, waterproof clothing, as many find the climate quite cold. However, warm clothing can also be purchased from a variety of stores. The coldest months are usually January and February, with average temperatures around 4°C, while July and August are the warmest, averaging 18°C.

Visiting other countries

If your child wishes to travel, they should check with the embassy or consulate of their destination country to see if a visa is required for their nationality. Obtaining a visa may be difficult if they apply towards the end of their studies in the UK. Many European embassies or consulates expect students to have between two and six months' leave to remain in the UK beyond the date of their proposed trip. Therefore, it's advisable for them to travel during holidays, such as Christmas or Easter, before their course ends.

Transport and travel

Solent University is located in the heart of the city which makes it an ideal place to live. For that reason, your child may not need to use public transport very often while studying with us. However, if they do, there is one main bus company in Southampton:

Financial information

Living costs in Southampton

It is difficult to estimate an individual's living costs as we all have different lifestyle requirements and spending habits. As well as your child's study costs, they'll also need enough money to support themselves while they are at university.

To be able to create an accurate budget, you need to be aware of all the costs your child will incur over a year. Utilities are included in halls fees but are likely to be separate if they are in private rented accommodation, so ensure all bills are handled fairly and are paid on time. Also, remind them to budget for Christmas and birthdays and one-off events that happen throughout the year. The following estimate does not include tuition fees and the costs of trips to and from home countries. It is important to remember, tuition fees are subject to increase year on year, and provision should be made for any rise in costs. In the table below, we have given a general guide with an estimate of average costs for accommodation in university halls and living expenses for a single student over a 40-week period. Remember, these figures can vary greatly depending on individual circumstances.

Guardianship

The UKVI require an original (not electronic) signature from a parent/legal guardian in order for students under the age of 18 to travel and study in the UK.

Our recruitment team will request this information before confirming your offer to commence your studies.

Top tips for parents

Access essential information

Make sure your child adds Solent University to their contacts. This will ensure our emails don't disappear into their junk mailbox, and no key information is missed.

Before moving

Check what is provided in the chosen accommodation before buying some essential household items. Some items may come with the accommodation, and many can be bought on arrival into the UK.
